

1. Introduction


Under an agreement with the Alabama Department of Transportation, the South Central Alabama Development Commission (SCADC) has continued a rural transportation planning program for the 2020-2021 fiscal year, covering the period from October 1, 2020 through September 30, 2021. The study area for the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Process includes the six counties, and the 26 municipalities located therein, that are served by the SCADC, in their entirety. These counties are Bullock, Butler, Crenshaw, Lowndes, Macon and Pike Counties. (See the map on the following page.) There are no urban areas in these counties. The South Central Alabama area is served by two interstate highways, six federal highways, and 20 major state highways. These highways offer both north-south and east-west regional access as well as access throughout the South Central Alabama area.

The purpose of the ongoing program is to assist the Alabama Department of Transportation in carrying out a Statewide Transportation Planning Process, as outlined in *Fixing America's Surface Transportation* (FAST) Act, 23 USC 134 and 135, by establishing a continuous and ongoing rural transportation planning process that will aid in the identification of rural transportation needs and issues of the South Central Alabama region. During the FY 2021 Rural Transportation Planning Program, rural transportation stakeholders and committees identified types of rural transportation priority projects that are common across the South Central Alabama Region. Citizen stakeholders in each county, however, identified specific rural transportation needs, issues and safety concerns. Further, stakeholders were provided with the opportunity to review and comment on the 2021 Statewide Public Involvement Plan.

Public involvement in the rural transportation planning program in South Central Alabama region continues to be a challenging, yet critically important, part of the process. Since the beginning of the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Process in 2006, the number of rural transportation stakeholders increased from 439 stakeholders in 2007 to 649 stakeholders during the 2021 fiscal year. During the 2020-2021 fiscal year, the following seven public involvement activities were conducted by the South Central Alabama Development Commission:

- One Steering Committee Meeting;
- Two South Central Alabama Development Commission Board Meetings;
- Website Notification;
- Stakeholder Postcard Direct Mail;
- Stakeholder Email Broadcast;
- Community Flyers; and
- Newspaper Advertisements.


The South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Region



2. Committee and Board Meetings

A meeting of the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee was held on Thursday, September 23, 2021. The meeting was held at the South Central Alabama Development Commission office, located in Montgomery, Alabama. Steering committee members were notified by e-mail with a meeting notice. Additionally, the general public was notified of the Steering Committee meeting by newspaper advertisement in six newspapers in the region. The following items are included for the Steering Committee meeting as documentation of the public involvement process followed in conducting the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee meetings: meeting notice, advertisement, meeting flyer, meeting agenda, meeting minutes (which includes attendance), and all meeting material that was distributed. In addition to the Steering Committee meeting, RPO presentations were made at a South Central Alabama Development Commission regular board meetings in November 2020 and August 2021. Board meeting agendas, attendance rosters and minutes are included as documentation.

The South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee is comprised of 22 members representing all six counties, the Alabama Department of Transportation, and the South Central Alabama Region. 

Steering Committee Meeting Minutes: September 23, 2021

The 21st meeting of the South Central Alabama Development Commission Rural Transportation Planning Program Steering Committee was held on September 23, 2021 at 10:30 AM at the offices of South Central Alabama Development Commission in Montgomery, Alabama. Mr. Benjie Sanders, Crenshaw County Engineer, chaired the meeting and called the meeting to order. Roll was called for the Steering Committee and a quorum was declared present. A copy of the attendance roster is attached and made a part of these minutes. Mr. Sanders asked members to review the minutes from the September 28, 2020 Steering Committee meeting that were included in their agenda package. Commissioner Alonza Ellis made a motion to approve the minutes as presented of the September 28, 2020 meeting; Mr. David Bollie seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Business

During the Communications and Updates portion of the meeting, committee members took the opportunity to update everyone on transportation activities in their respective areas. Mrs. Tracy Delaney informed the committee members of a change to the SCARPO FY21 Work Program budget to increase the funding with \$1,500 in state funding and \$375 in local match. The purpose of the additional funds was to assist the Alabama Department of Transportation (ALDOT) in public outreach and notification of the opportunity to review the State Public Involvement Plan, 2021 Update. Ms. Delaney referred to the PowerPoint Presentation to demonstrate the SCARPO outreach efforts and to inform members where they could find the draft plan, comment forms, and directions for submitting comments. Ms. Delaney then presented three documents for review by the Steering Committee: the SCARPO FY 2022 Work Program; the SCARPO Guiding Principles; and the SCARPO Public Involvement Plan. Ms. Delaney stated that the FY22 Work Program Budget was increased by \$4,500 in state funds and \$900 in local match to continue assisting ALDOT with public outreach efforts. Resolutions were presented to approve the FY22 Work Program, Guiding Principles and the Public Involvement Plan. Following the review, Mr. Jason DeShazo made a motion to adopt Resolution 21-01 to approve the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Organization FY22 Work Program; Mayor Mildred Whittington seconded the motion. The motion carried. Mayor Jacqulyn Davison-Boone made a motion to adopt Resolution 20-02 to approve the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Organization Guiding Principles; Mayor Whittington seconded the motion. The motion carried. Mayor Whittington made a motion to approve Resolution 20-03 to approve the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Organization Public Involvement Plan; Chairman Ellis seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Mr. Jason Fondren, of KPS Group in Birmingham, made a presentation of a wayfinding inventory study that had been conducted for Macon County. After considerable discussion, questions and positive response the presentation was concluded. Ms. Delaney then presented the list of transportation needs and issues that had been identified through the 2021 Rural Transportation Process. The lists were reviewed by committee members. Committee members stated that many of the items on the lists had been rectified through recent improvements. The needs and issues lists were updated during the meeting.

WHEREAS, the South Central Alabama Development Commission has prepared a FY 2022 Work Program outlining the tasks necessary to accomplish the goals of the cooperative planning process and the Rural Planning Organization; and


WHEREAS, the RPO Work Program has been duly reviewed, discussed, and approved by the RPO Steering Committee.

Resolution

Adoption of the Fiscal Year 2022 Work Program of the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Organization (RPO)

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, this 25th day of August, 2022, that the Board of Directors of the South Central Alabama Development Commission does hereby authorize the submittal of the *South Central Alabama Rural Planning Organization FY 2021 Work Program* as the guide for tasks to be completed by the Rural Planning Organization between October 1, 2021 and September 30, 2022.

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1.0 Introduction

1.1Purpose

The purpose of this document is to describe the work tasks that will be performed by the South Central Alabama Development Commission (SCADC) in Fiscal Year 2022 (FY22) in carrying out the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Organization's objectives as outlined in the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act, 23 USC 134 and 135. The South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Organization (RPO) includes the rural counties of Bullock, Butler, Crenshaw, Lowndes, Macon and Pike and the 26 municipalities located therein. All work outlined in the work program will be performed by staff of the South Central Alabama Development Commission or under subcontract with SCADC, as necessary. The planning process will be a one-year program sponsored by the Alabama Department of Transportation (ALDOT) and the South Central Alabama Development Commission. In FY22, the South Central Alabama RPO proposes to continue the public involvement and awareness process and rural transportation data collection by carrying out the work program tasks herein.

1.2Goals

The goals of the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Process are:

- 1. a well-managed rural transportation planning process;
- 2. an effective rural transportation committee structure;
- 3. a comprehensive data library and distribution source;
- 4. reports that are useful to ALDOT and the local governments; and
- 5. a well-informed public who actively participates in the rural transportation planning process.

1.3Format

The work program is divided into five tasks. The tasks outline the transportation planning work that will be performed by the staff at the South Central Alabama Development Commission, as staff of the RPO, over the one-year period (FY20) from October 1, 2021 through September 30, 2022. The description of each task includes the objective, proposed work, products, staffing, schedule, and budget information. Section 3.0 of the 2022 Work Program includes financial tables that summarize the work program budget.

1.4Title VI in the Work Program

The South Central Alabama RPO is committed to ensuring public participation in the development of all transportation plans and programs. It is the goal of the South Central Alabama RPO that the transportation planning process will be accessible, transparent, and inclusive. The RPO is and will be compliant with all Title VI programs, processes, and procedures including, but not limited to, 42 USC 2000d.

Guiding Principles

Region 5: South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Organization

Last Reviewed and Amended September 28, 2020.

PREAMBLE

The following constitutes the procedures and responsibilities that will serve to establish, organize, and guide the proper functioning of the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Process. This organization shall carry out transportation consultation, planning and programming functions as set forth in any agreements entered into by this process by and between the South Central Alabama Development Commission and the State of Alabama Department of Transportation, the United States Department of Transportation, or in such manner as events shall dictate.

Section 1.0: Process Name, Organization Name, Guidance and Study Area

- **A.** The name for the ongoing transportation process shall be the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Process.
- **B.** Until such time as a formal rural planning organization is established, the South Central Alabama Development Commission (SCADC) will be the organization that conducts the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Process.
- C. The SCADC will carry out the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Process under the guidance of the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee.
- **D.** The study area for the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Process shall be the six counties of the South Central Alabama Region (Bullock, Butler, Crenshaw, Lowndes, Macon and Pike Counties).

Section 2.0: The Organizational Structure

A. The organization shall consist of one (1) steering committee, six (6) county advisory committees and six (6) stakeholder groups. The Steering Committee will be the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee. The advisory committees will be the County Rural Transportation Advisory Committee for each county in the region. The stakeholder groups will include six countywide groups of all rural transportation stakeholders, one for each county in the study area. Additional committees and subcommittees shall be formed as deemed necessary.

Section 3.0: General Policies

- **A.** All general policies shall apply to all committees and participants of the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Process.
- **B.** All reports, programs, and plans shall be presented to the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee for their review. The Steering Committee shall be afforded sufficient time to comment on drafts prior to action. Reports, programs, and plans become official process documents following approval by the Steering Committee as reflected in Steering Committee Meeting Minutes.
- C. The South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee and the South Central Alabama Development Commission shall proceed with their respective responsibilities and duties with proper consideration at all times, for all modes of transportation and associated facilities.
- **D.** All studies undertaken in this process shall be coordinated with individual modal planning programs and with comprehensive planning efforts in the area.
- E. Rural Transportation Planning Process activities shall be used to promote efficient development.
- **F.** All published data and/or reports shall be made available to the public and agencies.

Section 4.0: Amendment of Guiding Principles

- **A.** Any section herein contained may be amended at any meeting of the Steering Committee provided such amendment be delivered to the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Process Coordinator at least ten (10) days prior to the meeting at which the amendment is to be presented to the Steering Committee. It shall be the duty of the Planning Process Coordinator to include in the Steering Committee Meeting Notice, notice of the proposed amendment setting out the exact form of the proposed amendment. Such amendment shall be approved if it receives the affirmative vote of a majority of at least a quorum of the voting members present.
- **B.** These rules shall be revised, updated, or amended as the circumstance dictates. This shall be the responsibility of the Rural Transportation Planning Process Coordinator.

RURAL TRANSPORTATION STEERING COMMITTEE GUIDING PRINCIPLES

Section 5.0: Purpose

A. The purpose of the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee will be to serve South Central Alabama as the decision making body for the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Process and to provide guidance to the South Central Alabama Development Commission in conducting the process.

Section 5.1: Responsibilities

- A. To give overall guidance to the rural transportation planning process
- **B.** To have overall responsibility for review and approval of all plans and programs which are developed by the rural transportation planning process
- C. To assist in the identification of rural transportation stakeholders in each of the six counties of the South Central Alabama region
- **D.** To recommend any other personnel necessary to fulfill and complete the duties and tasks relative to the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Process
- **E.** To take action on recommendations and other matters pertaining to the rural transportation planning process
- **F.** To approve rural transportation goals to guide the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Process
- **G.** To submit plans and recommendations to participating agencies and obtain resolutions for adoption from governing agencies
- **H.** To change the designated membership as deemed necessary
- I. To insure that citizen participation is achieved in the rural transportation planning process

Section 5.2: Membership

C. Appointments and Terms

- 1. County Commission and Municipal Representatives members will be solicited by the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Process Coordinator in a manner that ensures equitable representation of the South Central Alabama region. Members will serve until reappointed.
- 2. County engineers, representatives of the Alabama Department of Transportation, the Director of the South Central Alabama Area Agency on Aging and the Executive Director of the South Central Alabama Development Commission will serve terms on the committee coinciding with the terms of their respective offices.
- **D.** Each member may name an alternate (in writing) who may exercise full member powers during the member's absence. The term of the alternate will expire upon the expiration of the member's term or upon written notice by the member. The member will be responsible for notifying the alternate of meetings.
- **E.** Each member may name a proxy (in writing) for a particular meeting or vote. The proxy's power must be delineated in the written notice. The member is responsible for notifying the proxy of meetings.

Section 5.3: Officers

- **A.** Officers of the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee shall be chosen from the committee membership.
- **B.** The Chair shall be elected by the majority of the members in a duly constituted meeting and shall be an elected public official.
- **C.** A Vice-Chair shall be elected by the majority of the members in a duly constituted meeting to serve in the Chair's absence or in case of the Chair's vacating elected office.
- **D.** Election of officers shall be in the first quarter of each fiscal year (October December).
- **E.** The Rural Transportation Planning Process Coordinator will serve as the Executive Secretary on behalf of this committee in any other capacity desired by the committee.

Section 5.4: Meeting Procedure

- **A.** The rules of order herein contained shall govern deliberations and meetings of the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee. Any point of order applicable to the deliberations by this committee and not contained herein shall be governed by Roberts Rules of Order.
- **B.** The Rural Transportation Steering Committee shall meet at least twice every fiscal year.
- C. Meetings will normally be initiated by the South Central Alabama Development Commission. When providing notification for a meeting, at least two weeks' notice will be provided describing the time

- and location. A proposed agenda should also be provided to ensure that adequate preparation will occur. The 14 day notice may be waived if a majority of the members concur.
- **D.** A quorum shall consist of the Steering Committee members present, their alternates or proxies. The member may designate proxies (in writing) if the member and the alternate will be unable to attend a meeting.
- **E.** Voting shall be by voice vote; however, upon the request of at least one (1) member, voting shall be by roll call. In the event of a tie vote, the motion before the Steering Committee shall fail.
- F. All meetings of the Steering Committee shall be open to the general public.
- **G.** At the discretion of the Rural Transportation Process Coordinator and with the approval of the Chair of the Steering Committee a regularly scheduled meeting can be canceled. Notification of the cancellation shall be made at least three days prior to the date of the scheduled meeting.
- **H.** The Chair may request a mail or FAX vote on issues already presented at previous meetings. This practice will be used only if federal and / or state imposed deadlines are an issue. A mail or FAX vote will be presented at the next scheduled Steering Committee meeting as part of the previous meeting minutes.
- **I.** The presiding officer may move, second, and debate from the Chair and shall not be deprived of any of the rights and privileges of a member by reason of his/her acting as the presiding officer.

Section 5.5: Order of Business

- **A.** The business of the committee shall be taken up for consideration and disposition in the following order, unless the order shall be suspended by the unanimous consent.
 - 1. Call to order by Chair
 - 2. Roll Call
 - 3. Approval of minutes of previous meeting
 - 4. Communications from the presiding officer
 - 5. Report of officers and/or committees
 - 6. Old Business
 - 7. New Business
 - 8. Invitation to interested persons wishing to be heard on matters not included in the agenda
 - 9. Adjournment

COUNTY RURAL TRANSPORTATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE GUIDING PRINCIPLES

Section 8.0: Purpose

The purpose of the County Rural Transportation Advisory Committees will be to serve each county in the capacity of reviewing and prioritizing local rural transportation needs and issues, reviewing and guiding data collection for each county and making recommendations to the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee, as necessary, regarding local projects.

Section 8.1: Responsibilities

- **A.** Give overall guidance to the rural transportation planning process within each county
- **B.** Review plans and programs developed in the rural transportation planning process
- C. Assist in the identification of rural transportation stakeholders in the respective county
- **D.** Assist in the identification of rural transportation needs and issues for the respective county
- E. Insure that citizen participation is achieved in the rural transportation planning process
- **F.** Make recommendations, as necessary, to the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee regarding the inclusion and prioritization of local rural transportation projects and programs

Section 8.2: Membership

County Rural Transportation Advisory Committee members will be solicited by the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Process Coordinator in a manner that ensures equitable representation of each county. Members will serve until reappointed.

An appointed member may be replaced upon a member's resignation from the County Rural Transportation Advisory Committee or if a member fails to attend three consecutive meetings. The replacement committee member will be solicited by the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Process Coordinator in the same manner as the original County Rural Transportation Advisory Committee Members.

Section 8.3: Chair

A chair for each County Rural Transportation Advisory Committee shall be designated by the applicable County Commission Representative serving on the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee from the membership of the committee.

RURAL TRANSPORTATION PLANNING PROCESS COORDINATOR GUIDING PRINCIPLES

Section 9.0: Purpose

The purpose of the coordinator is to ensure that all requirements of the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Process are met.

Section 9.1: Designation

The Executive Director of the South Central Alabama Development Commission shall be the Rural Transportation Planning Process Coordinator for the South Central Rural Transportation Planning Process. In the absence of the Executive Director, that individual shall designate a staff member to serve as Coordinator.

Section 9.2: Duties

The Coordinator shall have the following specific duties:

- **A.** To act as a liaison between the parties of the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Process and assist in various phases of the process.
- **B.** To coordinate the process through the Rural Transportation Steering Committee and the six County Rural Transportation Stakeholder Groups.
- C. To arrange meetings, set agenda, and serve as Secretary for the Rural Transportation Steering Committee and for the County Rural Transportation Stakeholder Group meetings.
- **D.** To develop a Work Program as required.
- **E.** To present suggested changes of the recommended plan to the Rural Transportation Steering Committee and others, as appropriate, for their consideration.
- F. To provide staff and clerical assistance for Rural Transportation Planning Process activities.
- **G.** To monitor transportation planning in the South Central Alabama area and report apparent conflicts to the Steering Committee.



3. Rural Transportation Stakeholder Input

A goal of the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Organization is the identification of rural transportation needs and issues by local citizens. In previous program years, SCADC has conducted a combined public involvement and rural transportation stakeholder meeting in each of the region's six counties with the purpose of providing citizens with the opportunity to review and further identify local transportation needs and issues. Due to continued caution relating to COVID-19, the SCADC determined it was in the best interest of public safety to not conduct face-to-face stakeholder meetings during the FY21 program year.

For the program year, SCADC coupled the usual stakeholder services with outreach efforts to support the review and comment on the ALDOT 2021 Public Involvement Plan. SCADC employed a multi-pronged approach that included website notification, a direct mail campaign, an email broadcast, newspaper advertisements, and community flyers. Each public involvement method is described on the following pages with documentation of the effort. Although stakeholders were advised that they could submit comments on the 2021 ALDOT Statewide Public Involvement Plan to SCADC or directly to ALDOT, none were received by SCADC staff. Through the public involvement efforts, an additional 30 road improvement and transit needs were identified in the six county region. Lists of the identified rural transportation needs and issues are included in the Steering Committee Agenda Package found in Section 2 of this report, as well as in the 2021 SCARPO Rural Transportation Needs and Issues and Long-Range Planning annual report that is submitted to ALDOT.

SCADC Website Notification




Stakeholder Postcard Direct Mail

III. Notice of Activities

It is the goal of the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee to provide timely and adequate public notice of hearings, meetings, document reviews, and document availability.

IV. Public Input and Committee Response

It is the goal of the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee to demonstrate consideration and recognition of public input and to provide appropriate responses to public input.

V. Inclusive Process

It is the goal of the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee to encourage participation in the planning process by low-income groups, minorities, persons with disabilities, and the elderly; and to consider the needs of these groups when developing programs and plans.

STRATEGIES

A. The South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee will develop and follow a Public Involvement Plan and review the plan at least every five years.

Goals Addressed: I, II, III, IV, V

B. The South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee will maintain a Rural Transportation Stakeholder List in each of the following six counties: Bullock, Butler, Crenshaw, Lowndes, Macon and Pike.

The notice will include the meeting purpose, date, time, and location of the meeting. The notice will be provided to local media representatives and groups that address the needs of low-income groups, minorities, persons with disabilities, and senior citizens.

Goals Addressed: I, II, III, V

E. The South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee will provide a notice for all Rural Transportation Stakeholder Meetings to groups that address the needs of persons with disabilities. The notice will include the meeting purpose, date, time, and location of the meeting. The notice will request that interested individuals, who need special accommodations, notify the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee prior to the date of the meeting so necessary arrangements can be made. The South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee will follow all of the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Goals Addressed: I, II, III, IV, V

F. The South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee will consider all legitimate inquiries and comments regarding transportation planning activities. When warranted, a written response will be provided.

Goals Addressed: I, IV, V

G. The South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee will maintain a record of public involvement. The record will document the public involvement activities of the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee and the County Rural Transportation Stakeholder Committees.
