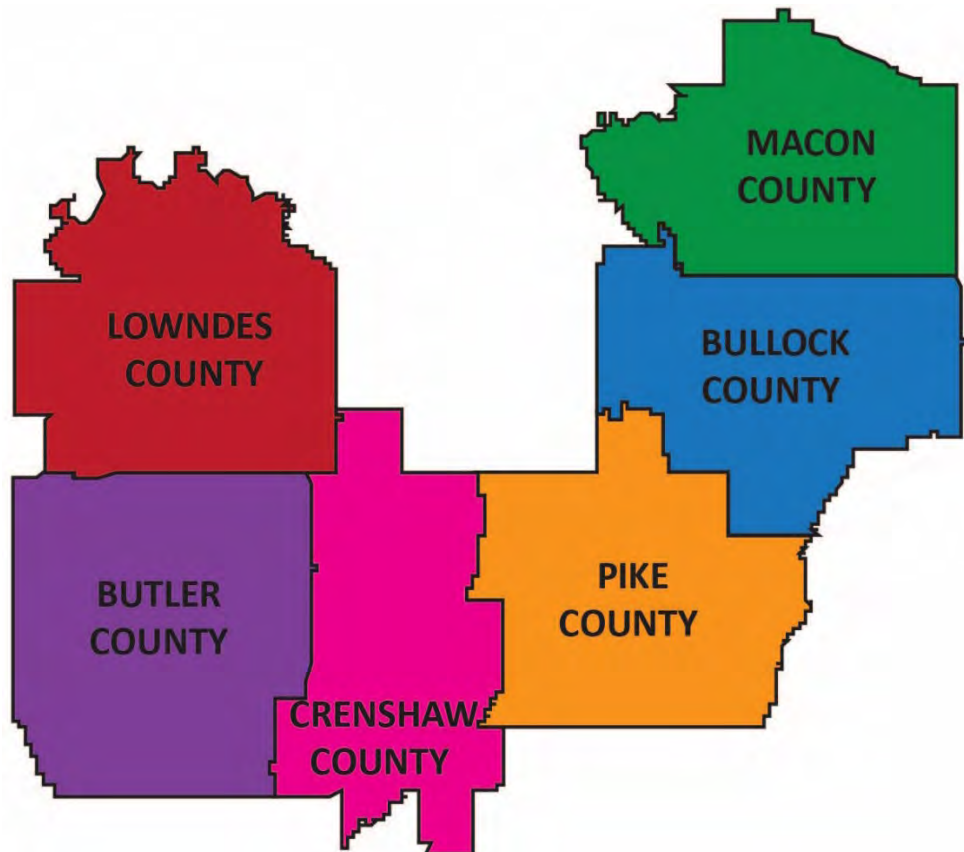

1. Introduction

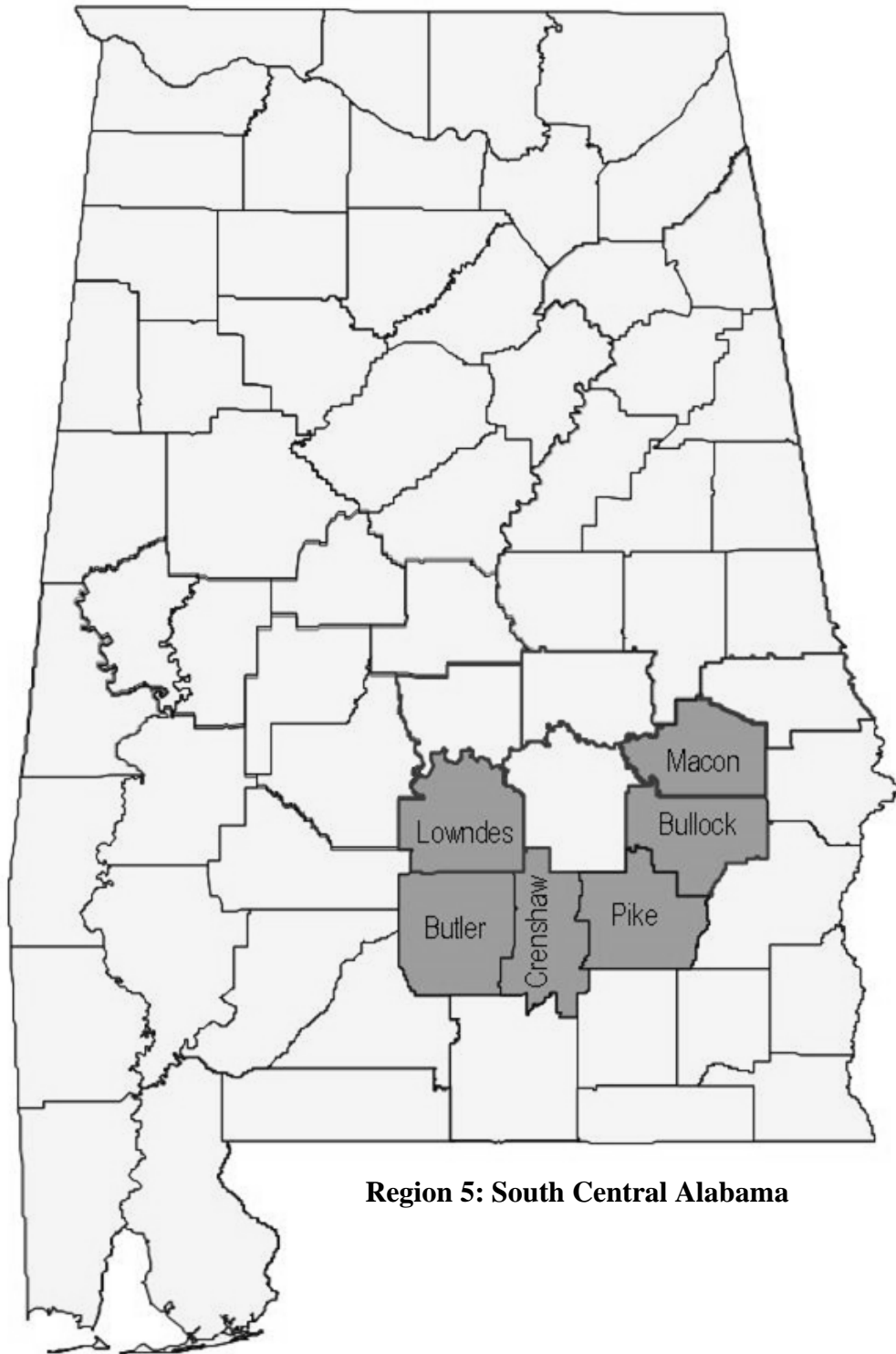
Under an agreement with the Alabama Department of Transportation, the South Central Alabama Development Commission (SCADC) has continued a rural transportation planning program for the 2021-2022 fiscal year, covering the period from October 1, 2022 through September 30, 2022. The study area for the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Process includes the six counties, and the 26 municipalities located therein, that are served by the SCADC, in their entirety. These counties are Bullock, Butler, Crenshaw, Lowndes, Macon and Pike Counties. (See the map on the following page.) There are no urban areas in these counties. The South Central Alabama area is served by two interstate highways, six federal highways, and 20 major state highways. These highways offer both north-south and east-west regional access as well as access throughout the South Central Alabama area.

The purpose of the ongoing program is to assist the Alabama Department of Transportation in carrying out a Statewide Transportation Planning Process, as outlined in *Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act, 23 USC 134 and 135*, by establishing a continuous and ongoing rural transportation planning process that will aid in the identification of rural transportation needs and issues of the South Central Alabama region. During the FY 2022 Rural Transportation Planning Program, rural transportation stakeholders and committees identified types of rural transportation priority projects that are common across the South Central Alabama Region. Citizen stakeholders in each county, however, identified specific rural transportation needs, issues and safety concerns. Further, stakeholders were provided with the opportunity to review and comment on the FY 2023 State Planning and Research Annual Work Program.

Public involvement in the rural transportation planning program in South Central Alabama region continues to be a challenging, yet critically important, part of the process. Since the beginning of the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Process in 2006, the number of rural transportation stakeholders increased from 439 stakeholders in 2007 to 675 stakeholders during the 2022 fiscal year. During the 2021-2022 fiscal year, the following seven public involvement activities were conducted by the South Central Alabama Development Commission:

- One Steering Committee Meeting;
- Two South Central Alabama Development Commission Board Meetings;
- Website Notification;
- Stakeholder Postcard Direct Mail;
- Stakeholder Email Broadcast;
- Community Flyers; and
- Newspaper Advertisements

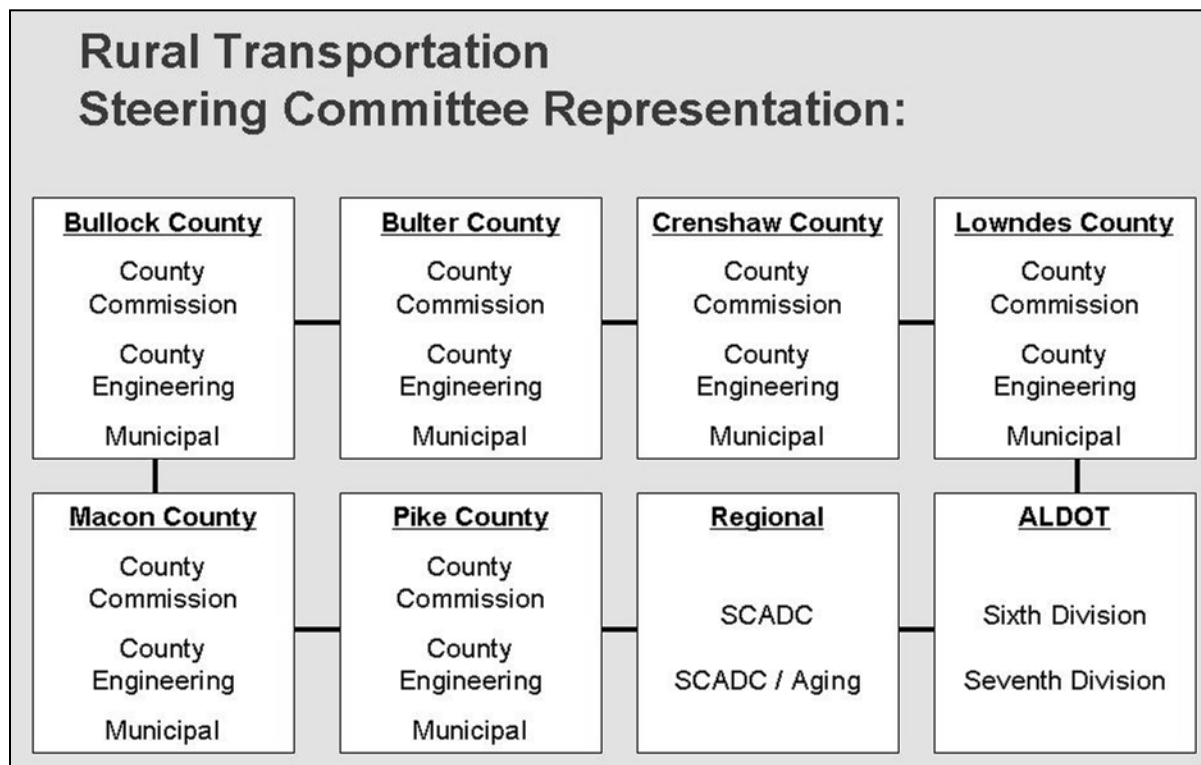

2. Committee and Board Meetings

A meeting of the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee was held on Thursday, September 23, 2021. The meeting was held at the South Central Alabama Development Commission office, located in Montgomery, Alabama. Steering committee members were notified by e-mail with a meeting notice. Additionally, the general public was notified of the Steering Committee meeting by newspaper advertisement in six newspapers in the region. The following items are included for the Steering Committee meeting as documentation of the public involvement process followed in conducting the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee meetings: meeting notice, advertisement, meeting flyer, meeting agenda, meeting minutes (which includes attendance), and all meeting material that was distributed. In addition to the Steering Committee meeting, RPO presentations were made at a South Central Alabama Development Commission regular board meetings in November 2020 and August 2021. Board meeting agendas, attendance rosters and minutes are included as documentation.

The South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee is comprised of 22 members representing all six counties, the Alabama Department of Transportation, and the South Central Alabama Region. SCADC Rural Transportation Planning Organization Steering Committee Meeting Minutes: September 14, 2022

The 22nd meeting of the South Central Alabama Development Commission Rural Transportation Planning Program Steering Committee was held on September 14, 2022 at 10:30 AM at the offices of South Central Alabama Development Commission in Montgomery, Alabama. Mayor Henry Peavey, Town of Franklin, chaired the meeting and called the meeting to order. Roll was called for the Steering Committee and a quorum was declared present. A copy of the attendance roster is attached and made a part of these minutes. Mayor Peavy asked members to review the minutes from the September 23, 2021 Steering Committee meeting that were included in their agenda package. Mr. Benjie Sanders made a motion to approve the minutes as presented of the September 23, 2021 meeting; Mr. Jason DeShazo seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Business

During the Communications and Updates portion of the meeting, committee members took the opportunity to update everyone on transportation activities in their respective areas. Following the county updates, Mr. Jason Fondren, of KPS Group in Birmingham, made presentations on two RPO projects that took place during FY 2022: (1) Macon County Wayfinding Study, Phase 2; and (2) Franklin Interstate Interchange Study. A copy of the PowerPoint presentation is included with these minutes. After discussion and comments, the presentation was concluded. Ms. Delaney then presented three documents for review by the Steering Committee: the SCARPO FY 2023 Work Program; the SCARPO Guiding Principles; and the SCARPO Public Involvement Plan. Ms. Delaney stated that the FY23 Work Program Budget was remain level at \$70,625 so that SCADC can continue to assist ALDOT with public outreach efforts. Resolutions were presented to approve the FY22 Work Program, Guiding Principles and the Public Involvement Plan. Following the review, Mr. George Sims made a motion to adopt Resolution 22-01 to approve the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Organization FY23 Work Program; Resolution 22-02 to Approve the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Organization Guiding Principles; and Resolution 22-03 to Approve the South Central Alabama Planning Organization Public Involvement Plan. Mr. DeShazo seconded the motion to adopt all three resolutions. The motion carried.

Following lunch, Ms. Delaney presented the list of transportation needs and issues that had been identified through the 2022 Rural Transportation Planning Process. The lists were reviewed by committee members. Committee members stated that many of the items on the lists had been rectified through recent improvements. The needs and issues lists were updated during the meeting.

Comments, Next Meeting Date and Adjourn

With there being no further items for discussion, Mr. Sims made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Mr. Sanders provided a second. With no further comments, Mayor Peavy adjourned the meeting.

Steering Committee Meeting Minutes: September 23, 2021

The 21st meeting of the South Central Alabama Development Commission Rural Transportation Planning Program Steering Committee was held on September 23, 2021 at 10:30 AM at the offices of South Central Alabama Development Commission in Montgomery, Alabama. Mr. Benjie Sanders, Crenshaw County Engineer, chaired the meeting and called the meeting to order. Roll was called for the Steering Committee and a quorum was declared present. A copy of the attendance roster is attached and made a part of these minutes. Mr. Sanders asked members to review the minutes from the September 28, 2020 Steering Committee meeting that were included in their agenda package. Commissioner Alonza Ellis made a motion to approve the minutes as presented of the September 28, 2020 meeting; Mr. David Bollie seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Business

During the Communications and Updates portion of the meeting, committee members took the opportunity to update everyone on transportation activities in their respective areas. Mrs. Tracy Delaney informed the committee members of a change to the SCARPO FY21 Work Program budget to increase the funding with \$1,500 in state funding and \$375 in local match. The purpose of the additional funds was to assist the Alabama Department of Transportation (ALDOT) in public outreach and notification of the opportunity to review the State Public Involvement Plan, 2021 Update. Ms. Delaney referred to the PowerPoint Presentation to demonstrate the SCARPO outreach efforts and to inform members where they could find the draft plan, comment forms, and directions for submitting comments. Ms. Delaney then presented three documents for review by the Steering Committee: the SCARPO FY 2022 Work Program; the SCARPO Guiding Principles; and the SCARPO Public Involvement Plan. Ms. Delaney stated that the FY22 Work Program Budget was increased by \$4,500 in state funds and \$900 in local match to continue assisting ALDOT with public outreach efforts. Resolutions were presented to approve the FY22 Work Program, Guiding Principles and the Public Involvement Plan. Following the review, Mr. Jason DeShazo made a motion to adopt Resolution 21-01 to approve the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Organization FY22 Work Program; Mayor Mildred Whittington seconded the motion. The motion carried. Mayor Jacquelyn Davison-Boone made a motion to adopt Resolution 20-02 to approve the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Organization Guiding Principles; Mayor Whittington seconded the motion. The motion carried. Mayor Whittington made a motion to approve Resolution 20-03 to approve the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Organization Public Involvement Plan; Chairman Ellis seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Mr. Jason Fondren, of KPS Group in Birmingham, made a presentation of a wayfinding inventory study that had been conducted for Macon County. After considerable discussion, questions and positive response the presentation was concluded. Ms. Delaney then presented the list of transportation needs and issues that had been identified through the 2021 Rural Transportation Process. The lists were reviewed by committee members. Committee members stated that many of the items on the lists had been rectified through recent improvements. The needs and issues lists were updated during the meeting.

Comments, Next Meeting Date and Adjourn

With there being no further items for discussion, Mr. George Sims made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Mr. Bollie provided a second. With no further comments, Mr. Sanders adjourned the meeting.

RESOLUTION 22-01

**Adoption of the Fiscal Year 2023 Work Program of the
South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Organization**

WHEREAS, the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Organization (RPO) was established to serve as the decision-making body and to provide guidance to local governments in conducting the non-metropolitan cooperative planning process, in cooperation with the Alabama Department of Transportation, for portions or all of Bullock, Butler, Crenshaw, Lowndes, Macon and Pike Counties in Alabama, as established in 23 USC 134 and 135 (as amended by the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act 11201, November 2021).

WHEREAS, the South Central Alabama RPO is interested in the continued development of the non-metropolitan cooperative transportation planning process as described in 23 CFR 450.210(b) through on-going public involvement and data collection of the rural transportation needs and issues of the citizens in the aforementioned counties; and

WHEREAS, the South Central Alabama Development Commission, serving as staff to the RPO is required to provide guidance to local governments in conducting the non-metropolitan planning process as a cooperative effort with the Alabama Department of Transportation as established in the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking June 13, 2014; and

WHEREAS, the South Central Alabama Development Commission has prepared a FY 2023 Work Program outlining the tasks necessary to accomplish the goals of the cooperative planning process and the Rural Planning Organization; and

WHEREAS, the RPO Work Program has been duly reviewed, discussed, and approved by the RPO Steering Committee.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, this 14th day of September, 2022 that the South Central Alabama RPO does hereby adopt and endorse the FY 2023 Work Program as the guide for tasks to be completed for the cooperative planning process.

**RESOLUTION 22-02
Approval of the Guiding Principles of the
South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Process**

WHEREAS, the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Organization Steering Committee was formed to facilitate consultation between local officials and the Alabama Department of Transportation; and

WHEREAS, the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Organization Steering Committee shall carry out transportation consultation, planning and programming functions as set forth in any agreements entered into by this process by and between the South Central Alabama Development Commission and the State of Alabama Department of Transportation, the United States Department of Transportation, or in such manner as events shall dictate; and

The County is not capable of fixing the damaged area as needed with appropriate drainage and re-surfacing. The town built the sidewalk wooden bridge several years ago, which has been a great asset to the town and was used constantly until we had to disassemble a section of it so the county could repair the washed out street. Now at this writing our insurance company has approved the bridge repairs and we have a bid to accomplish the restoration but was waiting on the county to accomplish their work. The town has, at our expense, modified the side walk approach to the North end of the bridge to help alleviate some of the drainage problem. We have met with excuse after excuse from the county. They have just dumped red clay on the shoulders which is already started to wash away. There needs to be a spill way and grate arrangement, and some curbing, at the erosion site mentioned earlier, to alleviate future problems. We need help from someone to get the road work accomplished. With each shower of rain there are more pot holes produced by the trucks.

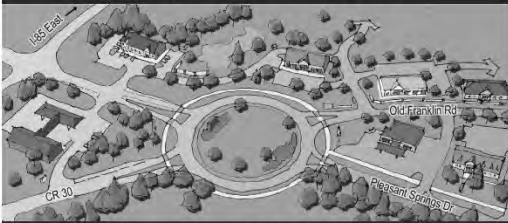


WHEREAS, the Alabama Department of Transportation (ALDOT) has contracted with the South Central Alabama Development Commission (SCADC) to administer the rural transportation planning process for all of Bullock, Butler, Crenshaw, Lowndes, Macon, and Pike Counties, pursuant to the requirements and applicable provisions of Title 23 USC 134 and 135 (as amended by the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act 11201, November 2021), and others that may be relevant; and

WHEREAS, the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Organization (RPO) continues to be interested in further development of the rural transportation planning process with ongoing public involvement and data collection regarding the rural transportation needs and safety issues of the above counties; and

WHEREAS, the South Central Alabama Development Commission as staff to the Rural Transportation Planning Organization, is required to provide guidance to local governments in conducting the non-metropolitan planning process as a cooperative effort with the Alabama Department of Transportation as established in the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking June 13, 2014; and



THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, this 24th day of August, 2022, that the Board of Directors of the South Central Alabama Development Commission does hereby authorize the submittal of the *South Central Alabama Rural Planning Organization FY 2023 Work Program* as the guide for tasks to be completed by the Rural Planning Organization between October 1, 2022 and September 30, 2023.

3. Rural Transportation Stakeholder Input

A goal of the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Organization is the identification of rural transportation needs and issues by local citizens. In FY 2022, SCADC continued a postcard and email campaign, along with newspaper advertisements and flyers to encourage stakeholder input on rural transportation needs and issues. For the program year, SCADC coupled the usual stakeholder services with outreach efforts to support the review and comment on the ALDOT Draft FY 2023 State Planning and Research Annual Work Program. SCADC employed a multi-pronged approach that included website notification, a direct mail campaign, an email broadcast, newspaper advertisements, and community flyers. Each public involvement method is described on the following pages with documentation of the effort. Stakeholders were advised that comments on the 2022 Draft FY 2023 State Planning and Research Annual Work Program should go directly to ALDOT. Through the public involvement efforts, an additional 55 rural transportation safety, road improvement and transit needs were identified in the six county region. Lists of the identified rural transportation needs and issues are included in the Steering Committee Agenda Package found in Section 2 of this report, as well as in the 2022 SCARPO Rural Transportation Needs and Issues and Long-Range Planning annual report that is submitted to ALDOT.

SCADC also assisted the Town of Franklin in gathering stakeholder input on the Interstate Interchange Development Study that includes a circulation and access management study.

SCADC Website and Social Media Notification

The South Central Alabama Development Commission maintains a website found at scadc.net which offers information about the agency's aging and community development and planning programs. Website notification was provided of (1) the September 23, 2021 SCARPO Steering Committee Meeting, (2) the opportunity to review and comment on the ALDOT Draft FY 2023 State Planning and Research Annual Work Program, and (3) a request for stakeholder identification of rural transportation needs and issues. RURAL TRANSPORTATION

The SCADC administers the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Organization (SCARPO) under a contract with the Alabama Department of Transportation (ALDOT) for the area inclusive of Bullock, Butler, Crenshaw, Lowndes, Macon, and Pike Counties. The purpose of the Rural Transportation Planning Organization is three-fold:

1. to establish a continuous and on-going rural transportation planning process similar to the metropolitan planning organizations (MPO) in urban areas;
2. to identify the transportation needs and issues of this non-metropolitan area through a variety of public involvement and awareness efforts; and
3. to assist the State of Alabama in the development of the Statewide Transportation Plan (STWP) Update.

A steering committee, representing each of the six counties served by the SCADC, provides overall guidance for the rural transportation planning organization. Each county has three members on the steering committee: a county commissioner, the county engineer, and one municipal elected official. Other steering committee members include representatives from ALDOT Local Transportation Bureau and the ALDOT Southeast Region Offices, SCADC, and the South Central Alabama Area Association on Aging. Additionally, advisory committees have been formed and rural transportation stakeholders have been identified in each county. Advisory committee membership is a local decision, but is generally comprised of representatives of all local governments in the county, the county engineer, boards of education, emergency management, human resources, local industries, chamber of commerce, industrial development board, healthcare, ministerial associations, senior services, non-profit organizations and interested citizens.

The South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Planning Organization planning program is open to the public. SCADC maintains a list of stakeholders by county that includes any person who has expressed an interest in rural transportation. SCADC uses these stakeholder lists for notification of rural transportation meetings to assist in the identification of rural transportation needs and issues in the region. Data gathered through the RPO planning program is sent to ALDOT in report form each year and is made available to the public through the SCADC website or upon request.

SCADC also works ALDOT to prepare a regional human services coordinated transportation plan every five years as required by the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act, which includes funding for Federal Transit Administration (FTA) programs for underserved populations for elderly persons and persons with disabilities through the Elderly Individuals and Individuals with Disabilities program (Section 5310). The FAST Act also provides funding for (1) the Urbanized Area Formula Funding program (Section 5307) to make resources available to urbanized areas for transit capital and operating assistance and transportation planning in urbanized areas; and (2) for the Rural Transit Assistance Program (Section 5311) to assist in the design and implementation of training and technical assistance projects and support services to meet the needs of transit operators in nonurbanized areas. The purpose of the South Central Alabama Regional Human Services Coordinated Transportation Plan is to identify transportation needs and coordination opportunities specifically for those agencies eligible to receive FAST Act funds. Additionally the plan looks at opportunities for increased coordination with those transportation providers that receive other program funds or are privately operated.

It is the goal of the South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee to encourage participation in the planning process by low-income groups, minorities, persons with disabilities, and the elderly; and to consider the needs of these groups when developing programs and plans.

STRATEGIES

- A.** The South Central Alabama Rural Transportation Steering Committee will develop and follow a Public Involvement Plan and review the plan at least every five years.
